JOB BOARD by Mark Palmer

If you read *Airworthy* regularly, you'll know that there is a hard core group of volunteers who are always taking on projects. The 840 project, the 3rd hangar shop, glider maintenance, and clubhouse maintenance are just a few examples. As a club, our success is dependent on all of us contributing in some way, big or small. Even if it's just vacuuming the clubhouse or taking the trash home at the end of the day, everything helps. Not all members are aware of what kinds of things need to be done. I've had some club members ask me what volunteer tasks are available.

I asked Steve Johnson, our maintenance manager, to provide me a list of some things that are currently on his to do list. If you see something on this list that strikes your fancy, contact Steve and let him know your interest and availability to help.

- Golf cart #1 needs troubleshooting and repair.
- Club gliders need TLC and cleaning.
- 3rd Hangar wall needs more sealing/spray foam at top and east/west edges.
- 3rd Hangar wall needs painting [or a mural?!].
- Grass will need mowing—either by the tractor or the small riding mower—and will also need trimming.
- Clubhouse refrigerator seems to run 24/7— repair or replace?
- Ladies room bench and vanity needs building and painting.

There will always be something! I'll try to make this column a semi-regular thing.

CARE AND FEEDING OF OUR BIRDS by Mark Palmer

There's been a trend lately to leave the club ships unwashed and uncovered at the end of the day. Not only is that not the club procedure, it's not the way we should treat our equipment. The last pilot of the day for each ship should plan on an extra ten or fifteen minutes to wash the wings and tails, wash the canopy, and install the canopy and wing covers (the Blanik and the PW-5 don't have wing covers, yet). It's easier to get the bugs and grime off while it's still fresh, rather than a week later after everything has dried.

It only makes sense. You don't want to come out to fly and find the ship covered in bugs and dust. It looks terrible, and now you have to clean it before you fly and it breaks your concentration.

There are buckets and sponges in each hangar for just this purpose. There's an outside spigot on the west side of the clubhouse and another spigot north of the 3rd hangar.

Very important: Wash canopies properly, using water to remove dust first. DO NOT use a dry rag. If you don't know how to properly wash a canopy yet, ask for assistance from an instructor or other experienced club member.

This is a <u>pilot</u> duty, NOT a <u>GOD</u> duty.

So remember, if you are flying a club ship and it's the last flight of the day, it's your responsibility to wash the ship and replace the covers. If you finish flying at noon and no one is on the schedule until 4:00, wash and cover. That late afternoon pilot might cancel. Leave the ships looking clean and ready to go for the next pilot (who could be you!). Treat the club ships like you would if you owned them, which of course, you do.

The team continues to make progress in spite of continued cold weather. We had one May work day that felt as cold as our January days, with the wind chill not rising much above 25°F. We are really hoping for warm weather so we can finish this bird up and get her flying!

We welcome **Frank DeBacker** to the volunteer team. He got a crash course in finishing tape application and has jumped right into the work. Completing application of the tapes and gussets is the primary work ahead for the team before we turn the fuselage over to **Doug Curry** for the spray coats.

Doug came by with the beautifully repainted vertical stabilizer. He temporarily installed it to help locate rudder cable exit points. We also identified the exit point for the elevator pushrod and locations for the inspection holes.

FRIDAY FLYING NOTE by Stan Bissell

The idea of Friday flying is enticing to those of us who have that flexibility, and Bill Gerblick has done a great job of making sure we have towpilots available.

However, I need to emphasize to everyone that we have no one assigned to ground duty on Fridays. If you put yourself on the schedule, don't assume there will be someone to drive the cart for you.

You will see that I am frequently on the Friday schedule with my students, but I don't do so unless my students can bring their own cart driver (typically a family member who is also a club member). You will see others doing the same thing: bringing their own qualified cart driver.

Our club has a long tradition of cheerfully helping each other out if and when we can, but simply hoping that someone will be there to help you may leave you stranded. I don't want to discourage anyone from flying on Friday. I would just ask that you consider the reality of the situation and make your own arrangements for ground handling.

FRIENDLY REMINDER: STOP BEFORE THE DROP!

During the landing roll, assure that the glider's wing does not scrape across the ground (read: rocks). Before the wing drops, hit the wheel brake. New saying: "Stop before the drop!"
